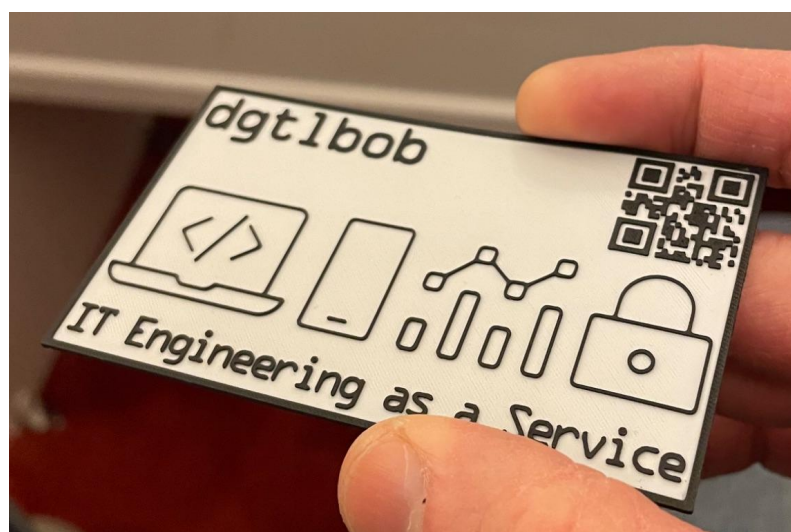
Bob Menkel
